OUR REGION

The Barossa region is largely rural, covering a land area of more than 2,200 square kilometres across the Barossa and Light local government areas. Residential living is concentrated in many small townships. Rural land supports grain and fruit crops, viticulture, and animal grazing. Tourism is vital to the Barossa region, known as one of Australia's foremost wine regions.

In 2016, the population was 38,282 — an increase of 1.3% since the previous year. The median age is 40.9 years, and follows South Australia's trend of a gradually ageing population.

Affordable housing and homelessness





HOMBURG HOMELESS PREVENTION FUND

In recent years, the number of homeless children in the Barossa region has been increasing. Currently, 44 children are known to be homeless.

For young people at risk of homelessness, a space to call their own is life-changing. In 2020, Foundation Barossa launched The Foundations Project.


It will fund the first Kids Under Cover youth homeless prevention studio in the Barossa, and create seed funding for a long-term, sustainable solution. Funds have been raised by individuals, companies and community groups, with children even donating pocket money.

Real estate agency Homburg have sponsored this fund, and for every property they sell and every new rental property they list, they will donate to the fund. The Homburg Homeless Prevention fund is an important step in our shared vision that no young person in the region experiences homelessness



CONCORDIS SOCIAL INCLUSION SCHOLARSHIPS

Foundation Barossa launched the Concordis Social Inclusion Scholarships as many in our community face challenges — like homelessness, mental health, domestic violence, and disability — impacting on social inclusion.

Kaesler, Seppeltsfield, Torbreck and Two Hands established the Concordis program to give back to the region. Sales of four vintages of their collaborative winemaking project have generated significant funds to support our community. The annual education scholarships are open to anyone experiencing disadvantage who wants to study at TAFE or university. The opportunity to study will help create pathways to redress disadvantage.

Disadvantage & poverty

Poverty occurs when resources do not meet basic needs. Disadvantage is felt in a variety of ways and impacts social inclusion, education outcomes, health, income, appropriate housing and employment.

BACK TO SCHOOL VOUCHERS

The Back to School initiative is part of the Rural Education Australia Program. Foundation Barossa has partnered with the Foundation for Rural & Regional Renewal (FRRR) since 2008 to provide these vouchers.

The national Back to School program provides \$50 vouchers to be used for items such as school uniforms, clothing, shoes, school bags and stationery.

The vouchers are more than just a \$50 gift. The program is about social inclusion and resilience, building confidence and morale in disadvantaged children.

More than 24% of the region are on school cards, indicating a low family income. This year we have contributed \$30,000 to provide vouchers for Barossa families that need them most.
